W.W. Chapman was the first congressman from Iowa (Territory), serving from 3 Dec 1838 to 27 Oct 1840.

"When the democratic convention met at Salem, Col. Chapman, a pro-slavery, Lane man, was elected president over Gen. J.W. Nesmith, a free-state democrat." Portland Oregonian, 18 June 1859.

"News arrived that Col. W.W. Chapman had been appointed Surveyor General of Oregon." Portland Oregonian 7 May 1859.

"Col. Chapman gave a monody on Lane's government at Portland Saturday." Portland Oregonian 20 October 1860

"This Chapman is a man without means or reputation and has long been trying to blackmail the O. S. N. Co. He has neither friends nor credit. I don't believe he could borrow fifty dollars in Portland without giving security... His railroad charter is worth nothing; no intelligent capital can ever be induced to take hold of it... He of course will try to annoy us, but he can do nothing, and we do not fear him."

W.W. Chapman was a director of the Portland & Valley Plank Road Company, started in 1850 as an improvement in the "Canyon Road" from Portland to Tualatin.

During the 10th and last Territorial Legislature, Chapman presented a petition from Lane County to recognize the right of Oregon citizens in the protection of slave property. It failed.

Chapman, William Williams (1808-1892) Born in Clarksburg, Va. (now W.Va.), August 11, 1808. Delegate to U.S. Congress from Iowa Territory, 1838-40; delegate to Iowa state constitutional convention, 1844; member of Oregon territorial House of Representatives. Died in Portland, Ore., October 18, 1892. Interment at Lone Fir Cemetery, Portland, Ore. (See also his congressional biography.)

Louisa County was named, at the instance of the representative of this district in the Legislature, after Louisa Massey, who had about that time made herself notoriously popular by shooting a villain to save the life of her brother. It was organized in 1837, and the first District Court held the same year, Judge David Irving presiding, with W. W. Chapman as United States District Attorney, and Zadoc C. Ingham, Clerk.

Death of Mrs. M. F. Chapman

At her home in this city, at 8:23 o'clock last night, occurred the death of Mrs. Margaret Fee Chapman, wife of Colonel W.W. Chapman. Although she had been ill for eight weeks, her sufferings were light, and her last days were quiet and peaceful. In her last hours she was attended by her husband, her daughter, Mrs. Brainard, and her sons, Thomas, Arthur I. and Winfield S. Her other living sons, W.W. and H.D., were absent, and not expecting her death.

Mrs. Chapman was a pioneer in three new countries, which are now the states of Illinois, Iowa and Oregon. She was the daughter of Colonel Arthur and Sarah Inghram, and was born in Tyler county, Virginia, January 8, 1816. She was married to Colonel W.W. Chapman when both were very young, on the 1st day of March, 1832, and their first child was born two years later, in Illinois. In 1835 they moved to Iowa, where their children Thomas, Arthur, William, Mary and Huston were born, and where they lived till the spring of 1847, when they started "across the plains" for Oregon, reaching their destination, after many hardships, late the same year. January 1, 1850, they moved to Portland, and became the owners of part of the townsite, and as much as any other two persons, helped to build the city which is now so prosperous.

For the last twenty-seven years the family residence has been at Twelfth and Jefferson streets, where the estimable lady breathed away her latest spark of life so peacefully last night. In Oregon, four children were born to them, Winfield, Harry, Clara and Margaret, the two girls having died in 1862 when they were 7 and 5 years of age. Portland Morning Oregonian, 22 June 1889, 2:5

According to his official Portland Death Record, Thomas died of meningitis. His residence was 667 1/2 Hood Street. He was buried in in the family plot in the Lone Fir Cemetery. Thomas never married.

In his Oregon Soldiers' Home papers, 27 June 1898, Thomas was 62y, 5'8", blue eyes, gray hair & sandy

complexion. He had been a Pvt. in Co. I, 2nd Reg't. OR Volunteers from 8 Nov 1855 to 14 May 1856 (close of war). He enlisted at Roseburg. He was indigent and had a hernia injury, occupation listed as miner; closest relative: W.S. Chapman of Portland. He was discharged 26 Jan 1899 for being "drunk and having whiskey in and about the home". He was readmitted 13 Mar '99 and discharged at his request 22 Mar. Readmitted again 12 Aug 1901, he was discharged 19 Dec 1902 for being AWOL 60 days.

PIONEER AND VETERAN

Death of Tom Chapman, Who Came to Oregon Nearly 60 Years Ago. The funeral of Thomas Chapman, who died early yesterday morning at Good Samaritan Hospital, will take place at Finley's Chapel at 2 o'clock this (Sunday) afternoon. The deceased was a pioneer Oregonian and Indian War Veteran, having come to Oregon with his parents, Colonel W.W. and Mrs. M.F. Chapman, in 1847, and became a resident of Portland in 1850, when his father became one of the townsite proprietors with D.H. Lownsdale and Stephen Coffin. "Tom" Chapman was only 19 when he took part in the Indian war in Southern Oregon in 1855-6, for which he was granted a pension only a month ago. He was admitted to practice in the courts of the territory of Oregon May 4, 1858, and his certificate was signed at Portland by George H. Williams, Chief Justice, and R.P. Boise, Associate Justice; but he did not pursue the practice of law. He was in the different mines of Oregon and Idaho from 1852 (1862?) to 1880, and took part in the Nez Perce war of 1877 as messenger for General O.O. Howard. When the Taylor Street Methodist Church was first organized Mr. Chapman was member of its choir, and when the Weekly Oregonian was established in the Fall of 1850 he was one of two boys who distributed about town copies of the first edition. Among the old-timers he had many acquaintances, all of whom will regret to learn of his death.

DEATH ENDS TROUBLES

Thomas Chapman, Who Attempted Suicide, Is Dead. - Thomas Chapman, an old man, who recently attempted to commit suicide by cutting the arteries in his wrists, was relieved of his troubles by death at Good Samaritan Hospital at 2:30 o'clock this morning. Death, however, was the result of heart trouble, the wounds in the old man's wrists having almost completely healed. Chapman gave no reason for his attempt to take his life on March 28, and the case was not reported to the police at the time. He had been despondent for a long time, and the attempt at suicide was the result. He was 69 years old. Arrangements for the funeral will be made today.

In Thomas' Indian War Pension File, there is a letter from him, written at the Old Soldier's Home in Roseburg, dated 6 Sep 1901. In this letter he mentions a niece, Mrs. McGuire, probably a daughter of his sister, Mary Catherine. A claim form dated 20 Mar 1903 shows his post office as Bremerton, WA. He was awarded a pension shortly before his death.

Arthur Chapman was a fascinating character. When just a boy, he and his brother Thomas delivered the first edition of the Portland Oregonian(4 Dec 1850) traveling by horse up and down the Willamette River going as far south as Corvallis, a distance of about 80 miles. During the Indian Wars of 1855-56 he served as a private in Capt. Benjamin Hayden's Co. G, 1st Regiment of the Oregon Mounted Volunteers. He was used primarily as a messenger between the Dalles and Walla Walla. In 1855, according to his pension application, he was 5'10" tall with gray eyes and light hair and complexion. He stated his age as 18 years and his occupation as "trader".

He and brother Tom went to Idaho County, Washington Territory (now Idaho) in 1861, perhaps to look for gold. He "squatted" on a tract of land near the mouth of White Bird Creek where he raised stock, mostly horses. He also ran a ferry across the Salmon River. Along the way, Arthur acquired the nickname "Ad", which some think was short for admiral. In the fall of 1862 he killed "Brockie", a notorious outlaw, by cleaving "his skull to the chin" with an ax.¹ Arthur was acquitted of the murder and most folks thought he had done society a favor.² He sold his place on White Bird Creek to Jack Manuel in 1874 and "bought" another ranch on Cottonwood Creek about 7-8 miles north of Mount Idaho, ID. He had an Indian (Umatilla?) wife and a son, both of whom died. He may have had other children by this wife.

When the Nez Perce War started in 1877, he raised a company of volunteers at Grangeville and was elected captain of the troop. They accompanied the US Army into the Battle of White Bird Creek. According to Indian accounts of that battle, Arthur fired the first shot in what turned out to be a disaster for the Army.

Arthur, who was fluent in the Nez Perce language, was with General O.O. Howard as a guide and interpreter during the entire Nez Perce War. And it was he who interpreted Chief Joseph's famous surrender speech- "From where the sun now stands, I will fight no more forever....." Depending upon which account one reads, Arthur was either a scoundrel or a hero; he was probably a little of both. He knew and was a friend of Chief Joseph and Arthur's descendants still have the peace pipe smoked at the end of the Nez Perce War. After the war, Arthur went as interpreter with Chief Joseph's band to a reservation near Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas. The remnants of Chief Joseph's group eventually ended up on a reservation near Quapah, Indian Territory (now Oklahoma). They called it "Eekish Pah", the Hot Place, where many of Joseph's band died. From there, he made at least two trips to Washington, DC as Chief Joseph's interpreter, meeting with President Rutherford B. Hayes and Secretary of the Interior Carl Schurz. While in Indian Territory, Arthur is said to have lived with a Modoc woman, leaving her there when he returned to Idaho.

He was back in Idaho by the fall of 1879 and was working for the Army at Fort Spokane in 1886. In 1888 Arthur was employed by the Army at the Fort Vancouver Barracks (Washington Territory) where he married Jennie Elizabeth Lovelace, a girl 30 years his junior. They had three children. The 1891 Vancouver City Directory indicates that Arthur was chief packer for the US Quartermaster Corp. The family was in Portland by 1899 and in 1900 he was listed in Polk's Portland City Directory as a surveyor.

Arthur was admitted to the Oregon State Insane Asylum at Salem in 1902 diagnosed with "cerebral softening" (Alzheimer's disease?). He died there 11 April 1905 and is apparently buried in an unmarked grave in the IOOF Cemetery at Salem, Oregon. Cause of death: "Exhaustion of dementia."

James was a lawyer. In 1885 he was a partner with Edward B. Watson (Chapman & Watson). He never married and died intestate. His estate (Multnomah Co. Probate File #1623) was valued at \$128.80, mostly law books & office furniture. It included 10 shares of N.P. History Co. James was a Mason. Columbia Rebekah Lodge No. 3, IOOF. His funeral was held in the family home and he was buried in Lone Fir Cemetery, Lot 7, block B7 (now block M7).

DEATH OF JAMES G. CHAPMAN.- James G. Chapman, who has been in poor health for the past year, died at the residence of his parents last evening. He was seized with uremic convulsions at 11 A.M., and died suddenly in a convulsion at 9 P.M. He had suffered from two similar attacks within a short time, and his system was much weakened thereby. Deceased is a son of Col. W. W. Chapman, and has resided in this city nearly all his life. He was admitted to the bar in 1866, and has ever since been engaged in the practice of the legal profession. He was a member of the Oregon Pioneer Association, the Portland Exempt Firemen's Association, and the Indian War Veterans. Deceased was unmarried. The time of the funeral has not yet been set.

!BIRTH: Notes from family bible. The bible says he died at Portland in 1887, but his mother's will (1889) and his father's obituary (1892) indicate he was still living. William was a contractor in Deer Lodge, MT. (1880 Census of Montana, town of Deer Lodge) He was a bookkeeper living in Virginia City, Madison County, MT 1870. Said to have been in Spokane, WA in 1900, but not found in 1900 soundex of MT, WA, ID. He appears to be listed as a contractor in the Polk's 1885 Portland City Directory. There was a W.W. Chapman on the Idaho Territorial Voters Poll Lists for 1863. He was in the West Bannock District of Boise County. West Bannock was the Boise Co. seat with a population of 6000 in 1863/64. It is now called Idaho City.

At the time of his mother's death (Feb 1889), he was living in Spokane Falls, WA Territory. Spokane Falls became Spokane in 1896. City directories of Spokane Falls, 1892-93, show a William W. Chapman as a dancing teacher. He is not in later directories. The 1890 Spokane Falls directory shows a Wm. Chapman as president of the Washington Biochemic Medical College with offices at 125 Tull block. These directories indicate that William and Anna were living apart.

Mary died of complications from a broken hip. At time of death she was living at 1352 N. Fairfax Ave., LA, CA - apparently the home of Mrs. Martha J. McGuire. Martha J. Maguire was her daughter, Nettie Mulholland. Her death certificate says she had lived in CA for 8 months, but it appears she might have been there since at least 1928. Other information indicates her residence was Union, OR at the time of her death. The 1920 census for King Co., WA (ED 313, sh 4) lists Mary Galbraith (a widow, age 74, b. IA) living at 4826 Fontanelle St. in Seattle.

The typed notes in the family bible say she was living at Union, OR at the time which was probably the late 1920's. Mary Galbraith was enumerated in the 1900 Census of Portland, but not listed in the 1897 or 1902 Portland City Directory. She and her third husband, Wm. J. Galbraith, were in the Bremerton, WA area in the early 1900's and she was living in Seattle in 1910 and 1920..

!BIRTH: Notes in family bible. Other information indicates he may have been born 28 April 1847. Huston was a surveyor, civil engineer and a lawyer. He lost his left arm in a shooting accident when he was 12.

In 1870/71 he was a surveyor in Pierce Co., WA. Huston was listed in the 1878/79 Burlington, IA directory as a civil engineer with offices at 210 Jefferson St., 3rd floor. His residence was at 418 Pine. He briefly practiced law in Winfield, KS and was later a bridge engineer for the AT & SF RR in building the line to Santa Fe, NM.

Huston left the railroad at Trinidad, CO to become a lawyer in Las Vegas, NM. He was representing the McSween faction in the Lincoln County War of 1877-78 when he was assassinated in Lincoln, NM 18 Feb 1879, the last man killed in the Lincoln County War. Billy the Kid was an eyewitness to his murder. A trial was held but no one was ever convicted. He is buried in an unmarked grave in Lincoln, NM.

DEATH OF HEUSTON(sic) I. CHAPMAN

The Trinidad (Colorado) Daily News contains the following account of the death of Heuston(sic) Chapman:

A special from Santa Fe reports that H.I. Chapman, of Las Vegas, was shot dead in front of the court house in Lincoln, Lincoln County, New Mexico on the 24th of February. Mr. Chapman came from Winfield, Kansas. He was in the employ of the Santa Fe company as bridge engineer until the work reached Trinidad when he quit the company's service and went to Las Vegas and engaged in the practice of the law. He was soon engaged as attorney for the McSween estate, and it was on account of his connection therewith, undoubtedly, that he was murdered. Mr. Chapman was a gentleman of fine attainments, respected by all who knew him, and a genial whole-souled companion. He had but one arm with which to defend himself, which makes his murder the more horrible. We are without particulars of the affair, but do not hesitate to denounce his assassin as a cowardly villain, who would not dare to meet even a one-armed man face to face in a fair fight.

Mr. Chapman was well-known in this city where he was reared. He is the son of Col. W.W. Chapman and a brother of W.S. and J.G. Chapman. He resided for a number of years in Steilacoom, Puget Sound. About two years ago Mr. Chapman went east.

Note: Huston Chapman actually was killed on Feb. 18, 1879.

"...A son of Col. W.W. Chapman, of Eugene City, accidentally shot himself on the 19th inst., with a double barreled shotgun--both barrels heavily loaded. Both charges, one of buckshot and the other of small shot, took effect in the left arm, between the shoulder and the elbow. Surgical assistance was obtained, and the arm amputated about two inches below the shoulder. He is doing well..."

"Col. Chapman's son, aged about 12 years, met with an accident on Monday. He was handling a rifle in his father's house, it discharged, and the ball so mangled his left arm that it had to be amputated. The father was in this city when this unfortunate accident occurred."

Winfield Scott Chapman, 78, native of Portland, who had served the city in various capacities since 1867, died last night at his home, No. 934 Milwaukie street. Death came as a result of a stroke suffered Saturday.

Born July 3, 1850, on the site of the present courthouse, he was a son of Colonel William Williams Chapman. He began his schooling in the Portland Academy and Female Seminary, a Methodist institution at Seventh and Jefferson streets, and at the age of 18 years was made assistant city surveyor. At 19 he was deputy county surveyor under H. J. Stephenson. Then began a career in city and county offices, broken only by a few lapses due to political changes.

In 1909 he married Euclid E. Crookham, who for many years was a teacher in the Portland high school. She died in April, 1923.

He was a member of Hassalo lodge of Odd Fellows, Harmony Masonic lodge and the Lang Syne society.

The body is at the chapel of Holman & Lutz.

At his death W.S. owned some acreage on the Oregon coast near Canon Beach. The acreage was sold for \$4500 to pay debts of the estate. It is now known as Chapman Point and oceanfront lots sell for \$200,000.

The Portland City Directory lists Winfield S. Chapman as City Surveyor in 1884-86. He is listed as Superintendent of Streets from 1887 on.

!BIRTH/DEATH: Oregon Death Certificate, Register No. 2108. Harra died of "general septicemia", aka blood poisoning, at the Hot Lake Sanitorium. He was listed as a resident of Aberdeen, Washington and was returned there for burial. Harra is the only child not listed in the page copied from the family bible.

Harra Davis "Harry" Chapman was born on the site of the Multnomah County courthouse March 17, 1853, where his parents' cabin then stood. His father was Col. W.W. Chapman, one of the owners of the townsite of Portland. His mother was Margaret Fee Inghram. They were pioneers of 1847. Harra first attended the old stone college (1859-1861) at Eugene where his father was Surveyor General of Oregon. They returned to Portland in 1861 and he finished his studies at the old Portland Academy. He graduated in 1868 at the age of fifteen, possibly its youngest graduate. Like all youth of the time, he was an active fireman and belonged to several militia companies, being at one time sergeant of the Washington Guards and subsequently first lieutenant of the City Rifles. In 1874 he began life on his own, migrating to California where he was employed by the Southern Pacific RR as assistant engineer. There, he helped lay out the towns of Lemoore and Hanford. Later he had charge of the construction of the last fifty miles of railroad across the Colorado Desert leading into Fort Yuma. In 1877 he returned to Portland for a brief period and then went to eastern Oregon where, in connection with H. McCartney, he surveyed a railroad line over the Blue Mountains. He returned to Portland until the spring of 1878 when he went to Walla Walla, Washington Territory to accept a position in the city and county surveyor's office. Subsequently he was elected to three terms as city surveyor. In 1885 he played a large part in inducing the principals of the Northern Pacific RR to lay a line to Walla Walla, for which he was not recognized until several years later. While a resident of Walla Walla, Harra was the constructing engineer for several of the largest flumes built in the Walla Walla Valley, notably the Governor Moore and Dr. Blaylock flumes.

With the support of his brother, W.S. Chapman, he also organized the Farmer's Railway, Navigation & Steamship Portage Company for the purpose of building a boat and portage railway around the Dalles of the Columbia. He sold out his interest in this project to Paul F. Mohr & Mr. Cannon in 1889. In 1886 Harry returned to Portland and engaged in the real estate business, remaining there ever since, with the exception of about five years on a farm located in Chehalis (now Grays Harbor) County, WA. In the fall of 1889 he became a stockholder in the Native Son Publishing Company, publishers of the "Oregon Native Son," where he shares management and editorial control with F.H. Saylor. Harra was married in 1878, but is now a widower. He has a family comprising two handsome daughters, Edith S. and Mabel Chapman.
